
From the President, Elida Brereton

Mahdavi shared with us a powerful message based on her work around the globe for UNICEF. Her account of the dreadful damage to children's mental and physical health in Ukraine, in Sudan, in Kenya and other countries suffering war, drought, revolution, and terrorism, was graphic and distressing, but UNICEF is making a difference despite relying greatly on private funding. The issues facing girls are of particular interest to Mahdavi and she opened our eyes to some of the appalling situations facing girls in some parts of the world.

Speaker: Madhavi Srinivasan Johnson from Chennai Sth India. "UNICEF - A Promise to Stay for Children in Crisis".



Madhavi moved to Australia in February 2019 and lives Melbourne. Her passion for and engagement in women's issues and girls' rights led her through a 26-year career international development/humanita rian work with UNICEF.

This was in India, Indonesia, Timor-Leste, Kenya, Namibia and USA HQ (New York) to promote human rights and gender issues affecting children, design strategies for programming, advocacy, communication for behaviour and social change. She held senior positions in Namibia, Kenya and New York and has travelled extensively in the southern African region. She published her first collection of short stories titled 'Demon on Fire and Other Stories' in 2020. She is currently working on her second book, a creative non-fiction recounting her experiences in Africa.

Madhavi gave an overview of Australia's involvement with the UN: Australia, a founding member of the United Nations, has been an active participant in UN institutions for 70 years, and was an original signatory to the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1948. Currently Australia is the 11th largest contributor to the UN regular budget. There have been several firsts for Australia in its association with the UN. Australia held the first Presidency of the Security Council, 1946 and provided the first military observers under the UN to Indonesia during the independence struggle. Since then, Australia participated in 62 United Nations and other multilateral peace and security operations as peacekeepers and Observers (MFO) and has played a leading role in successful regional missions in the Solomon Islands, Timor-Leste and Papua New Guinea.

As the quote above states UNICEF 'Promises to stay' to support the 1 in 6 of the world's children who live in a conflict zone. Nearly 200 million children are living in the world's most lethal war zones, the highest number in over a decade. Children have become frontline targets in 6 ways:

 Killing and maiming - Direct targeting or indirect actions, torture, crossfire, landmines, cluster munitions, improvised or other explosive devices or military operations, house demolitions, search-andarrests, or suicide attacks.

- 2. Recruitment/use of children in armed forces and groups compulsory, forced conscription or enlistment of children into any kind of armed force or group. The use of boys and girls as fighters, cooks, porters, messengers and spies, or when they are subjected to sexual exploitation.
- 3. **Denial of humanitarian access for children** Intentional deprivation or impediment of humanitarian assistance essential for survival, including impeding the ability of humanitarian or other relevant actors to access and assist affected children. Warring parties often deny humanitarian actors access to those in need or prevent assistance from reaching civilian populations and humanitarian workers are targeted, treated as threats, as has occurred at in Gaza.
- 4. Targeted attacks on schools or hospitals that cause destruction of such facilities causing catastrophic impact and gross violation of children's rights.
- 5. **Abduction of children** Unlawful removal, seizure, capture, apprehension, or disappearance of a child either temporarily or permanently. Either intentional or as retaliation, to instil fear among populations, or to forcibly recruit and/or sexually abuse children. Boys have accounted for around three quarters of verified instances of abducted children. However, girls remain at risk of being abducted, including for sexual violence and exploitation. Children who are abducted may also become victims of other grave violations, such as killing, maiming, sexual violence or recruitment into armed groups.
- 6. Rape or other grave sexual violence acts of rape, other sexual violence, slavery and/or trafficking, prostitution, forced marriage or pregnancy, sterilization, or sexual exploitation and/or abuse of children, used to intentionally humiliate a population or to force people from their homes. Stigma around rape means it is under-reported and disproportionately affects girls, who were victims in 97 per cent of cases 2016 to 2020.

The war in Ukraine has caused significant damage to vital infrastructure, impacting access to electricity, heating, water, telecommunications, schools and pre-schools damaged or destroyed, affecting families' incomes, access to services and disrupting education of Ukraine's children, with potentially lifelong consequences. Children in the frontline have been forced to spend up to 5,000 hours in basements and bomb shelters over the last two years - the equivalent of six months. As of September 2023, only around half of schools had been able to implement face-toface learning and, in critical areas of the east and south of the country, just 15 per cent of children were able to attend classes, with the rest studying online. UNICEF estimates from last year that 1.5 million children are at risk of depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder and other mental health issues.

UNICEF was in Ukraine before the conflict, and has stayed working alongside national and local authorities, as well as civil society organizations, to deliver emergency assistance and support services to families fleeing war in Ukraine.

UNICEF in Ukraine provides support to make sure there is heating infrastructure, winter clothing and blankets for children; engage children in formal/-formal education and provide learning supplies; mental health and psychosocial support including gender-based violence services; safe water where water supply networks are damaged and provide sanitation and hygiene supplies; healthcare and reach vulnerable households with cash assistance.

UNICEF also works in neighbouring countries that have received Ukrainians fleeing, to provide support to children and their families through local councils and NGOs.

Devastating violence and insecurity in Sudan erupted in April 2023, forcing millions of families from their homes in search of shelter, food and safety. More than a million have fled across borders. This is especially dire for children and families trapped in areas directly affected by conflict, insecurity and protection risks. Civilian infrastructure across Sudan has been decimated, leaving communities without essential services like clean water and basic health care. Loss of family income and the socioeconomic fallout are proving devastating to the well-being of children. In 2023, Sudan saw the highest number of verified violations against children in more than a decade, a five-fold increase to a year earlier, including killing, maiming, sexual violence, and recruitment of children by armed groups. Sudan is now grappling with the biggest child displacement crisis in the world, with an estimated 5 million forced from their homes, compounded by disease, hunger, malnutrition, restricted humanitarian access - a combination that has claimed thousands of lives, now facing a hunger catastrophe.

Across 190 countries and territories, UNICEF does whatever it takes to help children survive, thrive and fulfil their potential, from early childhood through adolescence. UNICEF's programs are supported by contributions from governments, foundations, intergovernmental orgs, the private sector, and individuals. Contributions to UNICEF come as direct or indirect funding, volunteers, consultants, and seconded personnel, partnerships, equipment, and other in-kind donations. In 2023, total contributions to UNICEF were US\$8.92 billion. The <u>public sector</u> contributed the largest share: US\$6.55 billion from government, intergovernmental and inter-organizational partners, as well as Global Programme Partnerships.

UNICEF's advocacy and programme work revolves around the 48 child-related SDG indicators organized around five domains of child well-being — Survive and Thrive, Learning, Protection from Harm, Safe and Clean Environment, and Life Free of Poverty. In 2015, the global community adopted the 2030 Agenda FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT to work together to build a future where every child has the opportunity to reach their full potential.

Substantial improvements have been seen in child survival and development over the last 30 years but there have been setbacks due to the pandemic, while routine immunisation, rising malnutrition, school attendance has not improved the foundational skills of over 600 million children and adolescents. In poor countries, child labour persists. 12 million girls annually are subjected to premature marriage.

Accelerating action to achieve child-related SDG targets is smart economically. Investing in children today and along the life-course strengthens human capabilities and builds future generations who are fulfilled and can contribute to economic growth and national well-being. Eventually!

Inquiry into Ambulance Victoria calls for submissions

The service was built in a certain way for a certain purpose, but their purpose is now far broader. New technologies mean officers even deliver early treatments now and they provide the opportunity for rather ill people to be cared for out of hospital (e.g., Palliative care) but need emergency support.

Maybe a seismic rebuild is required to provide more effective care, rather than same staff for acute AMI requiring resuscitation and other different support requirements. You notice in busy times ambulance staff beg "only urgent calls", clearly they have already identified a potential to triage to another tier of ambulance, maybe several tiers. I am looking forward to collating our community experience, and, in particular, raising the point that the lower cost of in-home care is only possible when supported by such services.

NCWV would like to hear from members, delegates and friends on their experiences with Ambulance Victoria.

Please also read the following request from the Legislative Council Legal and Social Issues Committee.

The Legislative Council Legal and Social Issues Committee is calling for submissions to an inquiry into the core issues impacting the management and functions of Ambulance Victoria.

The Committee will inquire into issues involved with call taking, dispatch, ambulance ramping, working conditions and workloads of paramedics, procurement practices, allegations of fraud and embezzlement, governance and accountability and the workplace culture within Ambulance Victoria.

"The main focus of this inquiry will be on working conditions for paramedics and other employees and how that impacts patient care, and on the internal operating practices of Ambulance Victoria," said Committee Chair Trung Luu. We want to hear from Victorians with experiences with Ambulance Victoria, including employees and patients," he said.

Protecting Victorian Newborns and Infants Next Winter

Minister for Health Mary-Anne Thomas today announced \$18.7 million to deliver a new long-acting monoclonal antibody as part of a coordinated national prevention program for unprotected newborns and eligible infants up to eight months, from Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV). The free infant vaccine will complement an expected Commonwealth-funded maternal vaccine as part of the coordinated national program – ensuring as many babies are protected from RSV as possible.

The monoclonal antibody is a long-acting vaccine that will be available for Victorian babies and infants whose mother was unable to be immunised or was immunised less than two weeks before delivery. The infant vaccine provides protection for about five months. A dedicated catch-up program will also be offered for eligible Victorian infants aged up to two years who are vulnerable to severe RSV and entering their second RSV season.

In most cases, immunisations will be administered in a hospital setting as part of standard post-birth care, helping parents avoid any additional healthcare costs and time spent attending appointments. For the 2024 RSV season, Victoria secured doses of the antibody for infants and children at the most severe risk from the virus.

I have received a reply from IDCARE on how we can protect ourselves from hackers. Please see below.

Thank you for contacting IDCARE. Our charity is a national community service that provides individuals with tailored response plans based on our view of current identity and cybersecurity risks. From the information that you have provided to us, you are concerned about your compromised credentials.

The below response plan is divided into the three main areas with actions you may choose to perform to enhance further protection measures in relation to your information. This email contains hyperlinks to IDCARE's fact sheets, Learning Centre and other relevant organisations. You may also prefer to research any hyperlinks to external organisations independently to locate the relevant information.

Detect - How do I know if someone is already using my information?

Check your existing accounts (Banking and Finance, Government Services, Social Media, Utilities, Online Shopping and other accounts) for unrecognised transactions, purchases or account changes to personal particulars e.g. name, address, mobile, email address, username, password.

Protect Other Existing Accounts

IDCARE strongly recommends using unique passwords and setting up Multi-Factor Authentication (MFA) for your online accounts. You can do this with Hotmail, Gmail and on the Microsoft website for an (@live.com email address. Wherever you can set up MFA you use an App on your device such as Google Authenticator (Google Play / AppStore), or Microsoft Authenticator (Google Play / AppStore), rather than an SMS.

Contact your telecommunications provider/s, inform them of what has happened, and request additional security be added to your account In addition to running antivirus we recommend the following action response considerations:

- Check the Login Activity for your accounts and sign out of any unrecognised devices (<u>Microsoft</u>, <u>Gmail</u>, <u>Yahoo</u>, <u>AppleID</u>, <u>Facebook</u>)
- Check for any forwarding rules on any email accounts, including your application and web email interface (Outlook/Hotmail, Gmail, Yahoo).
- Check for any of your email items that have been placed on your RSS feed folder in Outlook or other email browser if used (This is where cybercriminals store emails they have sent or received they are trying to hide).
- Check your account recovery settings for unknown phone numbers and emails you may not recognise in your email, Microsoft, or other online accounts such as social media.
- o **If you have social media accounts,** a number of providers in their Settings and Privacy / Security areas allow users to run privacy and security checks. We recommend that if these are available to run these checks and regularly change your passwords and follow the advice above in relation to setting up multi-factor authentication. Additionally, do not click on any links that your friends send to you and verify any serious claims that the profile makes with the actual person through other methods (give them a call etc.).
- Check that your superannuation fund account details remain unchanged and talk to your super fund about additional security measure options whenever changes are attempted, or transaction applications are made (such as attempts for early access).
- Notify your banks or other financial institutions of concerns, seek advice regarding cancelling and replacing any credit
 or debit cards, request additional security on you accounts, update your login details, and use multi-factor
 authentication (MFA) where possible.
- Contact any Buy Now Pay Later institutions where you hold accounts and request updated security.

If misuse has already occurred, what can I do?

Reporting cybercrime in Australia ReportCyber is an online cybercrime reporting system operated by the Australian Cyber Security Centre. When you submit your report, you will receive a reference number which can be used when extending a Credit Ban past the original 21 days. Information you submit in your report will be sent to the appropriate police jurisdiction for assessment, however not all reports are investigated.

Be vigilant and stay informed. Keep being super vigilant about scams and phishing emails. Having a little bit of information exposed (such as your full name, address, date of birth, or phone number) can make the job of scammers really easy in convincing people about their deception. Never feel pressured to respond immediately to unsolicited communications and do your own research. To stay abreast of the latest scams, identity theft and cybercrimes impacting our community you can subscribe to our <u>free online newsletter</u>.

It was good to reflect at the recent Law Institute of Victoria <u>Legal Sector Dinner</u> on access to justice, the role of lawyers and the law. Too often our legal system delivers unequal access to justice – different standards of justice depending on who you are, where you live and how much is in your bank account. Last week's <u>announcement</u> by National Cabinet of major funding to help end gender-based violence, including significant funding for frontline specialist and legal services, is welcome in this regard.

Transforming child justice The National Children's Commissioner's new report on Australia's child justice approach calls for transformational change that puts child wellbeing first and addresses the root causes of offending by children.

Childcare has been in the news. That's because the Government has been handed

a report by the Productivity Commission and it recommends that Australia build a universal early childhood education and care system. The findings of the report also show that a \$10/day cap on daily childcare fees will lead to the biggest increase in the number of children attending childcare. They also show that a \$10/day model will allow thousands of parents to enter the workforce should they choose to. That means **NOW** is the moment to get active. The Government is considering how it would implement the Productivity Commission's recommendation to build a universal early learning system — and you can help push them to opt for a fixed fee \$10/day model - which would be best for children, parents and the economy.

Thrive by Five already has a draft bill ready, which, if passed would establish a universal early learning system in Australia with fees capped at \$10/day, three days a week for most families, and free for low-income families. It will make a huge difference in the lives of families and children – and you can help us make it a reality. Will you take a moment to email your local MP and ask them to publicly support our bill which will cap early learning fees at \$10/day? National Threatened Species Day, 7 September each year, when many people stop and reflect on the fact that on that same date in 1936, Australia's Tasmanian tiger, also known as the thylacine (Thylacinus cynocephalus), slipped over the extinction line. A few days later, Environment Minister Tanya Plibersek announced 20 plants and animals had been added to the threatened species list. It comes on the back of last year which had more species added than any other year since the list was established. We need to protect our native plants and animals.

Together with state environment groups from across the country, we're calling on government to deliver strong laws – this year – to stop our iconic wildlife and plants from going extinct.

Speak up for strong nature laws

Viva Energy's Geelong gas terminal proposal is back, and we've only got one month to respond to their revised plans. A couple of years ago. Viva put forward a proposal to build a huge floating gas terminal in Corio Bay, which would

A couple of years ago, Viva put forward a proposal to build a huge floating gas terminal in Corio Bay, which would import enormous amounts of gas into Victoria – the equivalent of up to 600,000 tonnes of climate pollution. Thousands of Victorians spoke up against the project, as part of the Geelong Renewables Not Gas Alliance. Together with local schools, residents groups, fishing and boating enthusiasts and other environment organisations, we held rallies, lobbied MPs and made 2000 submissions outlining serious concerns with the proposal. In March 2023, the Victorian Planning Minister announced that Viva Energy's environment statement had serious deficiencies – sending them to redo crucial studies on marine ecology, noise impacts, air pollution and cultural heritage. The community hoped Viva would drop the project. Instead, they've come back for a second round. So, yet another Environment Effects Statement with submissions and hearings and we're being forced to check Viva's homework again.
